

President's Message

For nearly 26 years, Indian River Habitat for Humanity has helped families achieve what seems to them an insurmountable goal, namely home ownership. But as families have discovered, Habitat can make these goals achievable, not by a "hand out", but by a simple "hand up".

This past year we celebrated our 25th Anniversary with the theme "Much to Celebrate, More to Come."

Yes, we certainly have "Much to Celebrate". In this year alone we provided a "hand up" to 92 families through a combination of 16 new homes, 6 rehabbed foreclosure homes, and 70 repair projects for the elderly, infirmed and

veterans. During the affiliate's now nearly 26 year history, we have served 763 families locally and an additional 867 families overseas.

During this past year we also saw the completion of a major expansion and renovation project at our award winning ReStore, proceeds of which fund 1 in 3 of our new homes.

But we are not resting on our past achievements. The 25th Anniversary theme also states there is "More to Come". This was made evident with the unveiling of our most ambitious goal yet, namely serving 500 families within 5 years. Hopefully you can agree with me that the Habitat "hand up" model of providing strength, stability, and self-reliance through shelter really works, and is worth expanding in Indian River County so that another 500 families can be blessed in the next 5 years.

This ambitious, and some might say, audacious goal, begs an important question – "how will we accomplish this?" With God's grace leading donors, volunteers, churches, businesses, and community organizations to partner with us, this will be achievable.

Thank you for your past support of this vital ministry and I look forward to what God can accomplish through your partnership with Indian River Habitat. This work would not be possible without your commitment and dedication.

OUR ROOTS

Habitat for Humanity was founded in 1976 by Linda and Millard Fuller as a Christian ministry dedicated to the elimination of poverty housing worldwide. Today Habitat affiliates in nearly 70 countries partner with people in need to build decent homes for their families. More than 3 million houses have been built and 10 million people have been served through this ministry.

OUR AFFILIATE

Indian River Habitat became an affiliate in September 1991 building their first home by 1992. Since that time the organization has continued to grow and has served over 763 families in Indian River County. Today that is accomplished through a combination of new construction and the repair of existing dwellings. Through our tithing we have also served 867 families overseas in areas of disaster such as Nepal, Bangladesh and Haiti.

OUR LEADERSHIP

Indian River Habitat is a non-profit organization, but also a construction company, a retailer and a mortgage lender. Locally, the direction and guidance of our program is managed by an active and diversified board of directors who provide expertise in these four aspects of our activities. They espouse the philosophy of not giving hand-outs, but instead partnering with working people to build a decent home and future for themselves.

we stand for home

...because what we build is much more than just a house

Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed (A.L.I.C.E.). This is how the United Way describes 30% of Indian River County's population. That is, working families whose household income does not meet the minimum survival budget of \$50,448 a year for a of family of four.

Month-after-month, these families struggle to cover the cost of basic needs, including paying the rent. Earning minimum wage, an individual would have to work a minimum of at least 80 hours a week in order to afford the average rent cost of at least \$850 a month for a two bedroom apartment in Indian River County.

To cope, low-income families are forced to make tough choices to meet the continually rising costs of housing. Cutting back on groceries, taking second jobs, cutting back on healthcare or moving to less safe neighborhoods are just a few of the tradeoffs that working families often times have to make, just to pay rent. Habitat for Humanity offers a sustainable solution -- affordable homeownership.

We give working families the hand up they need, while asking that they contribute: "Sweat equity," committing to a monthly saving goal and attending required homeowner education and financial literacy classes.

In the end, we give much more than just a house. We know and understand the equalizing effect of homeownership, especially for families suffering generational poverty. Homeownership builds security, raises the educational attainment of children, improves neighborhoods, helps drive the economy and even helps to improve health.

In offering affordable homeownership, we give families strength and stability. We give them safety and security and provide a better and decent place for children to live, grow and thrive.

That is, we give families a place to finally call home.

What it Takes to Become a Habitat Homeowner

HAVE A DEMONSTRATED NEED.

Need is shown by situations that include inadequate housing, overcrowding, and affordability.

PERFORMING "SWEAT EQUITY"

In lieu of a down payment as a home buyer you will work 300 hours on building a house or 500 for a couple.

BEING FINANCIALLY SOLVENT

You will be current on all debt, apart from medical.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

You will need to save \$2,000 to fund an escrow account before closing.

A DESIRE TO LEARN

Attending 12 mandatory classes ranging from home maintenance to budgeting and predatory lending.

TAKING THE RESPONSIBILITY OF HOMEOWNERSHIP

Learning that the appearance, maintenance and upkeep of your home is your responsibility alone.


MAKING YOUR MONTHLY PAYMENT

Giving priority to paying making payments for your zero-interest loan, insurance and your taxes.


A WILLINGNESS TO PARTNER

Understanding that it is not a gift, but something you will have to earn. Demonstrating the desire to do all that is required to make this dream a reality.

Encouraging independence, Habitat homebuyers are given several opportunities in making decisions about the construction details of their future home. For example, they select the community in which they'd like to live, the lot on which to build their future home, the color of shingles to place on their roof, exterior paint color, light fixtures and style of cabinetry.







New Construction

A typical Indian River Habitat newly constructed home is about 1,100 square feet and consists of 3-bedrooms and 2-bathrooms.

To suit the need of large families, the affiliate offers 4-bedroom, and if necessary, 5 bedroom homes.

Each new home must pass a 22 point inspection, is built to Miami-Dade code (ability to resist or withstand up to Category 5 hurricane winds) and meets EPA energy efficiency standards.

Going Beyond New Construction

A new home is not the answer for every family. There are many who have lived in the same house for decades, but sadly have seen their dwelling deteriorate to the point it can no longer be viewed as a "Home".

As it is often the case these people, do not wish to relocate or can even afford to do so. For the past couple of years your Habitat has been providing home repair services, performing major or critical repairs and weatherization related improvements. Alterations have also been undertaken to help handicapped people with mobility issues.

Sometimes all that is required is caulking and paint that we call "a brush with kindness" that can be accomplished at minimal or no cost depending on the circumstances. The latter is often performed by college students during spring break.

Families in need must be willing to partner and must be agreeable to pay back part of the costs. The repair program has had appeal to many seniors, retirees and veterans living on limited fixed incomes. Once done they can again call their house a "Home".









Going Beyond Shelter

ENHANCING THE LIVES OF OUR HOMEOWNERS THROUGH EDUCATION

During the most recent recession, Habitat homeowners were either laid off or saw a decrease in work hours. They recognized the need to grow personally, and likewise the importance of encouraging their children to pursue education beyond a high school diploma. It was at this time that our "Scholarship Program" was created. This support program functions at three levels.

PERSONAL HOMEOWNER GROWTH

This part of the program provides financial support for homeowners who wish to further their education. For example, several Habitat homeowners have graduated with nursing degrees. To date, fifty two homeowners have received scholarships through this program.

COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP

To support the children of Habitat homeowners, we provide college scholarships to Indian River State College as well as out of town institutions. Scholarship recipients have graduated from institutions that include the University of Miami, University of Central Florida, Georgia Tech, Florida State University and the University of Florida. To date, forty seven students have received scholarships through this program.

AFTERSCHOOL AND SUMMER PROGRAM

Childcare is the largest expense category for working families with young children. In fact, the cost of childcare exceeds costs associated with housing, food and transportation. Although we do not run afterschool or childcare programs, we work in partnership with agencies that administer these programs by providing stipends for Habitat families. To date, we have provided over 350 stipends through this program.



PROGRAM SUPPORT

Since its onset in 2008 the scholarship program has been supported by donors who believe in the necessity of its objectives. This year, we received a generous bequest from the Estate of Ronnie Lee Vansweringen. 

The Expansion Worked

"When we embarked on the ReStore expansion, we did so first and foremost because we were thinking about volunteers, customer experience and ultimately, the families we serve," says Sheradi Monroe, ReStore General Manager.

We were cramped for space and our "un" air conditioned warehouse was not an agreeable work environment in the summer months.

Recruiting and growing a core of ReStore volunteers, easing the donor experience during donation drop off and providing a pleasant customer experience were critical to the Restore's goal to serve more and more families in need.

"There is no way we would be able to process and sell all these donations without volunteers," Sheradi explains.

Since the expansion, the ReStore has had record sales month after month and has seen a 40% growth in the number of volunteers serving at the ReStore.

"When volunteers have a working environment they enjoy, they'll keep coming back to serve families," says Sheradi. She continues, "When customers have a comfortable shopping experience, they stay longer and they too will keep coming back."

Donations received and sold at the ReStore generate revenue that works to build one out of every three homes built by Indian River Habitat for Humanity.
