- Establishment of the Indian River Habitat Endowment Fund to provide for the future of workforce housing in our community.

Together, staff, donors, and volunteers will continue to build more than just houses; we will build opportunities and hope. 



Shaniqua, her 3-year-old daughter, and her newborn son currently live in an apartment that far surpasses 30% of her income.

Shaniqua is eager to build a home that can grow as her precious children grow.

Working as a Certified Nursing
Assistant and freelance hairstylist
while simultaneously coping with the
loss of two older children may seem
insurmountable for some. However,
Shaniqua is more motivated than ever
to provide stability for her family.

"My life has been trying, but I'm still here," Shaniqua begins. "I can get through anything."

Since age 18, Shaniqua has moved from rental to rental. Fourteen years later, and with assistance from Habitat, Shaniqua is ready to become a homeowner.

"I've been renting essentially my whole life. It's finally time I own something," she said.

Shaniqua's two eldest children may not physically move in with them, but their memory and spirit continue to direct her path, especially through the homebuying process.

The Grand Harbor Community Gives Back

What's your favorite day of the week?

If you ask Grand Harbor residents Rose Virgin and Annette Jameson, the answer is clear - Wednesdays.

For them, each Wednesday begins and ends in laughter, with steadfast volunteer efforts happening throughout.

Rose and Annette have each volunteered in the ReStore for over a decade. However. the pair don't work alone, as they comprise a larger collective of 37 engaged volunteers. Though most crew members are seasonal residents, they have logged over 1,000 volunteer hours in the last year alone.

Since the ReStore opened its doors in 2005, Grand Harbor has had an active presence. Before ReStore Wednesdays originated,

Grand Harbor volunteers mainly worked on the job site. From there, involvement and interest continued to grow. The group broke into two segments, and in 2014, Rose began leading the ReStore team.

"I love that our involvement helps to increase store earnings," Rose began. "The mission can continue to build 1-in-3 Habitat homes."

When an item is donated to the ReStore, the profits generated from that item go directly toward the building of affordable housing.

Each Wednesday during the season, the Grand Harbor crew helps price and coordinate the sale of merchandise - including housewares, linens, clothing, art, lamps, and electronics. If the group feels their workday wasn't sufficient, they'll even come in additional days to ensure progress is made.

"We're so eager to get things sold. We do whatever is needed to get the job done." Rose said.

Rose and Annette beam with pride when they consider how volunteering has positively impacted their lives.

"Every day I go home, I feel like I've made a difference in someone's life. And I did it with my Grand Harbor friends," Annette said.

When deciding where to devote his time after retiring, Mike Schwartz sought out an organization that checked all his boxes – fiscally responsible, hands-on, and provides quality-of-life assistance to vulnerable populations.

For Mike, Habitat for Humanity's mission is directly aligned with his interest in people.



In 2003, Mike and his wife Mary purchased their home on Orchid Island. Before moving to Florida, Mike was equally engaged in his community, owning and operating radio stations from the 1960s through the late 1990s. In addition to his professional career, he led a philanthropic one. Mike helped build the very first Habitat home in Providence, Rhode Island. This experience furthered his passion for Habitat.

Shortly after relocating to the area, Indian River Habitat's then President, Andy Bowler, contacted him about getting involved locally. Andy connected Mike with Brad Burnham, one of the founding partners of The Moorings Yacht & Country Club's community-led effort to support Habitat. Brad mentored Mike and helped him establish a Habitat partnership within Orchid Island.

"The single most important thing for someone to have is a home," Mike said.

This sentiment alone fueled his desire to get involved in a big way, inspiring his prominent presence in leadership and volunteer efforts every Thursday before passing his hammer to a younger generation of Orchid Residents.

Mike looks at his 13-year tenure and those currently serving with admiration for what's been accomplished. Since its founding, the Orchid Island community has financially sponsored and worked on 28 Habitat homes. These homes comprise Fellsmere's Grace Meadows community.

"You aren't just handing a family a key to a new home. You're handing them the key to a new life."

Though Mike has stepped down officially, the mission of Habitat has never left his heart. He is just as invested in Habitat families now as he was when volunteering. He credits the success of Orchid Island's partnership with Habitat to those who worked alongside him, those currently serving, and those who will step up when it's time.

"Fresh eyes and fresh ideas are important. It's how we continue to move the needle forward and see success."

United Way of Indian River County

From home repairs to new home construction, togetherness is central to Indian River Habitat's mission. Habitat partners with families to offer a hand-up to homeownership – walking alongside them as they work to build stability and security for generations to come. To provide these hard-working families a decent place to live, Habitat also partners with volunteers, donors, and funders, such as United Way of Indian River County (UWIRC), to build homes and hope.

Considering the current housing affordability crisis, United Way's Board of Directors voted to make a \$100,000 investment in Indian River Habitat's Neighborhood Revitalization program. This grant supports the completion of critical and emergency home repairs for local homeowners living on a fixed or limited income.

Critical home repairs can range from roof and AC replacements to accessibility modifications such as wheelchair ramps and grab bar installation.

"This investment by UWIRC will allow us to provide critical and emergency home repairs to people that are very low income and would not be able to afford to stay in their homes without the help this program provides," Trevor Loomis, Indian River Habitat's President and CEO said.

Ensuring families have a place to call home, and can grow, thrive, and age gracefully in them is equally critical to Habitat's mission. Thanks to the support received from UWIRC, Habitat is able to help families remain in the place they call home.

In addition to offering a "hand up" to Habitat, staff from United Way got their hands dirty.

In honor of International Women's Month this past March, Indian River Habitat launched its Women Build campaign – highlighting and empowering women through affordable homeownership. UWIRC built a team, picked up a toolbelt, and got to work hammering alongside Habitat homebuyers, volunteers, and fellow supporters.

Housing security, whether achieved through new home construction or home repairs, is a major point of emphasis for both organizations. Together, they are working to combat a national epidemic one partnership at a time.





Sarah's Story

Building Every Day

Since entering Habitat's homeownership program, Sarah has been eager to build more than just a house. The personal growth, independence, and confidence she's established in the last year alone speaks to her determination to build a more secure life.

Sarah left Nevada and returned to her hometown in Florida, hoping to escape an abusive relationship and start anew. That drive to succeed is fueled even further by her desire to provide a more stable environment for her daughters, Chanel (8), Sariah (7), and Ciara (6).

"I never saw myself being independent. So, this house? It's not just a house," Sarah said.

Sarah has taken advantage of the tools she's acquired on her journey to homeownership and will no longer allow anyone or anything to silence her voice or stand in the way of her hopes and dreams.

One of the things Sarah looks forward to most is family dinners around a table. Eating a meal with your family, at the same table, is a regular occurrence for most families. For Sarah's family, this luxury is unavailable in their current rental. In addition to peace of mind, she'll soon have

a defined dining space and bedrooms that will allow her daughters to continue to grow and thrive in their individuality.

Building neighborhood relationships is an unexpected byproduct of the Indian River Habitat homebuyer program. Sarah recalls seeing a fellow homebuyer and saying, "Hey! I've caulked your house!" While our family partners work on the houses of others, a bond forms that continues to grow and creates a neighborhood where residents truly care about one another.

Before taking control of her life, Sarah was not allowed to have her own money or determine how to spend it. Today, she has grown a healthy savings account, completed well over 60% of her 'sweat equity' hours, and is doing everything to set the best example for her children. With the help of other Habitat homebuyers, volunteers, and generous donors, Sarah is not alone on her journey.

"I had nothing before. Now, I'm building everything for me and my daughters. I am so grateful for the opportunity to own a home and for the confidence this entire process has instilled in me."

Samyola's Story

The Scholarship Program

Samyola and her mother moved into their Habitat home when she was 12 years old. Even in adolescence, she knew that her journey would include helping people. What Samyola didn't realize was that the foundation her mother created through Habitat homeownership would guide her steps later in life.

Samyola and her two infant children lived in a one-bedroom, third-floor apartment. She recalls her son taking his first steps on the many flights of stairs. This scenario was not what she envisioned for her children. A safe yard for play and a stable environment to call home drove Samyola to think of Habitat. Since she grew up in a Habitat home, she was familiar with the process and ultimately decided that this was the first step to achieving the stability she grew up having.

In 2014 Samyola became a Habitat homeowner.

"It was a domino effect. All my dreams started coming true once I purchased my Habitat home." After becoming an Indian River Habitat homeowner, Samyola qualified for tuition assistance through Habitat's Scholarship program. In November 2017, she completed the Licensed Practical Nursing program and passed her board certification that next February.

Samyola's yearning to be more active in her community came to a head during the Covid-19 outbreak in 2020. She again decided to utilize Habitat's Scholarship program to continue her education and become a Registered Nurse.

"I never even graduated high school. I got my GED when I turned 18," Samyola began. "This is my purpose. I wanted a career I could be proud of. I want my kids to be proud of me."

Samyola is set to graduate in the Spring of 2024 and looks forward to becoming the version of herself she dreamed of being.

"I wrote down in elementary school that I wanted to be a nurse, and soon, I will be. Thanks to Habitat's Scholarship Program," Samyola said.
